Classroom to firehouse: A new opportunity for Dayton students

The Dayton Fire Department, in cooperation with Dayton Public Schools, is launching a new opportunity for high school students to graduate as certified firefighters and emergency medical technicians.

Students who complete the new Fire/EMS CTE program will be eligible to apply for an entry level position with the Dayton Fire Department upon graduation. The program is an extension of the City of Dayton Homegrown Heroes initiative that seeks to increase the number of women and minorities in the City's safety forces.

"Our goal is to encourage young people to consider a career in emergency services," said Chief Jeffrey L. Payne. "Students completing this program will be certified State of Ohio Level II Firefighters and Emergency Medical Technicians immediately following graduation."

The Fire/EMS CTE program will be a four-year experience for Dayton Public School students enrolled

at Belmont High School in grades 9 to 12. Courses will be taught by Dayton Fire Department instructors and will include preparatory and career exploration classes for the first two years. Students will then take the Ohio Firefighter I course, followed by the Firefighter II and Emergency Medical Technician courses during the 11th and 12th grades.

"This cooperative effort between Dayton Public Schools and the Dayton Fire Department will enhance opportunities for our students. Becoming a firefighter or an emergency medical technician is an excellent career choice now available to DPS students. We are excited for this new CTE program and the partnership with the Dayton Fire Department," said Elizabeth J. Lolli, Dayton Public Schools Superintendent.

Current 8th and 9th grade students enrolled in the Dayton Public School system will be eligible to apply for the program, which is scheduled to begin with the start of the 2019/20 school year.

FAQs

Q: Can I park on the street?

A: Yes, but you must be available to move your vehicle when paving operations begin. The contractor will post "NO PARKING" signs no more than 72 hours in advance of any work. The contractor will attempt to identify and alert the owners of vehicles in the way of the paving operation prior to commencement. If these vehicles are not moved in a timely manner or the owner cannot be located the vehicles will

be towed at the owner's expense.

Q: How long will it be before my street is paved?

A: Once the street has been milled (old asphalt removed) the contractor has 7 days (weather permitting) to place the new surface course of asphalt.

Q: When can I drive on it?

Resurfacing of residential streets is funded by a number of sources including the City of Dayton Your Dollars, Your Neighborhood program (Issue 9) and Community Development Block Grants.

A: Once the paving operation and traffic control devices are out of the vicinity the pavement will be open to traffic. This process can take up to 3 hours.

Q: Will speed humps/bumps be replaced?

A: Yes, although they will not be replaced with the initial paving operation separate crews will return and replace any traffic calming measures that were removed as a result of the

removal of the old asphalt.

Q: Will my curb and sidewalk be replaced?

A: No, curb and sidewalk is the responsibility of the adjacent property owner and should be maintained in a safe and nuisance-free condition.

Q: Where can I find a list of alleys to be resurfaced this year?

A: A list of alleys to be resurfaced, along with a map of the proposed residential streets to be resurfaced over the next five years, can be found at daytonohio.gov. Under the "Government" tab, select the Public Works Department. Toggle through the Public Works page to find this information located under the "Quick Links" section.

Home improvements: Do I need a permit?

A little planning can prevent a lot of problems.

Knowing if a project requires a permit or other requirements such as written plans is the starting place for residential property improvements. Because requirements differ for different kinds of projects, checking with the Division of Building Inspection (after some online research, if you can) is essential.

For example, in the city of Dayton, adding a shed (200 sq. ft. or less) to a residential property does not require a building permit, but does require meeting some zoning guidelines and passing a zoning inspection. Getting the necessary information up-front will prevent delays or do-overs later.
