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Fireworks and celebrations go together. Remember, fireworks can cause serious burn and eye injuries. Find out how to prevent these injuries.



Fireworks are synonymous with our celebration of Independence Day. Yet, the thrill of fireworks can also bring pain.

Remember, fireworks can be dangerous, causing serious burn and eye injuries. You can help us prevent fireworks-related injuries and deaths. How? By working with a national, state or local organization where you live to promote fireworks safety in your community.

Follow these safety tips when using fireworks:

- Never allow young children to play with or ignite fireworks.
- Avoid buying fireworks that are packaged in brown paper because this is often a sign that the fireworks were made for professional displays and that they could pose a danger to consumers.
- Always have an adult supervise fireworks activities. Parents don't realize that young children suffer injuries from sparklers. Sparklers burn at temperatures of about 2,000 degrees - hot enough to melt some metals.
- Never place any part of your body directly over a fireworks device when lighting the fuse. Back up to a safe distance immediately after lighting fireworks.
- Never try to re-light or pick up fireworks that have not ignited fully.
- Never point or throw fireworks at another person.
- Keep a bucket of water or a garden hose handy in case of fire or other mishap.
- Light fireworks one at a time, then move back quickly.
- Never carry fireworks in a pocket or shoot them off in metal or glass containers.
- After fireworks complete their burning, douse the spent device with plenty of water from a bucket or hose before discarding it to prevent a trash fire.
- Make sure fireworks are legal in your area before buying or using them.

JUNE 1 - AUGUST 1, 2021 SUMMER CHALLENGE PROGRAM



Dayton Metro Library's annual [Summer Challenge](#) is nothing if not adaptable. Last summer, when COVID restrictions made in-person programming impossible, DML quickly pivoted to offering online programs and new ways for kids to earn prizes. This summer, DML adapts again, with in-person, outdoor "[Pop-Up](#)" programs, [Take and Make Kits](#), and more flexible options for earning prizes. While some of the details may change, the goal of Summer Challenge remains the same: to keep children engaged in learning and creative experiences while they're out of school for the summer.

DML's Summer Challenge runs from June 1 to August 1. Children of any age, from babies through high school, can participate. Details about participation options, prizes and more can be found [here](#).

"This year we're focused on three key activities: reading, learning and helping," said Mandie Burns, Youth Services Director. "Kids do these activities all the time without realizing how they contribute to their growth and development. Our Summer Challenge not only brings a kind of mindfulness to these activities, but rewards kids for setting and achieving their goals, too."

What activities can be counted?

Reading books, ebooks, audiobooks, magazines, comics, manga, and more (or being read to, for pre-readers).

Learning through Library activities, camp experiences, church programs, online learning, educational TV, or school programs.

Helping family or friends by doing chores, volunteer work, taking care of siblings, community cleanup, helping a neighbor, or assisting someone else in countless other ways.

Kids and families can keep track of the time spent doing any of these activities either [online](#) or with a paper tracker. Prizes are earned at different achievement levels. Additionally, a \$529 CollegeAdvantage Savings Award will be presented to one winner drawn in each of four age categories: Birth-3 Years, PreK-K, Grades 1-6, and Grades 7-12.

OFFER LIBRARY ACTIVITIES ON THE GO

Families count on the Dayton Metro Library to provide educational materials that support learning and create a bridge between school and home. This year, with hybrid learning taking place across the region and summer fast approaching, DML is responding to the need for free, high-quality science materials with new [Take & Make Kits](#). The first Kits, with a Nature theme, will be available for pickup at all Dayton Metro Library locations starting Thursday, April 22 - Earth Day.

“Our Take & Make Kits meet community need in an innovative way,” said Julie Buchanan, Programming Manager. “Kids can work independently or with their families to explore STEM themes, learn something new, and see how science integrates into everyday activities.”

Each specially-marked Take & Make box offers games, puzzles, instructions for a craft project or experiment, and all the needed supplies (or a list of supplies available at home). There are different themed activities for different age groups: families with young children who will need assistance, kids in grades 1-6 who need minimal assistance, and teens who can work independently. Each month, a new Take & Make Kit will be available with a different theme and all new activities.

Also tucked into each box are details about participating in free, virtual programs hosted by partner organizations such as [Five Rivers MetroParks](#), [The University of Dayton's River Institute](#), and the [Glen Helen Raptor Center](#).

“The Library is dedicated to working with our partners to celebrate water, animals, and nature,” said Buchanan. “Their programs take each theme beyond games, puzzles and crafts, giving kids an opportunity to learn about real-world science and nature topics from experts,” said Buchanan.

Undesign The Red Line Exhibit at Main Library – Aug 6 – Sept. 25, 2021- Redlining is how structural racism was designed into cities - a practice which continued legally into the 1970s, and continues to have ramifications today.

Redlining maps were introduced in the 1930s to show risk areas for federal funding of home ownership programs. These maps showed areas that were prime for investment, and areas where no money would be lent. The neighborhoods where no investment would be made were outlined in red, literally “redlined.”

Children's Hunger Alliance Food Distribution

Dayton Metro Library's partnership with Children's Hunger Alliance continues this summer, with free, shelf-stable meal pickup offered at all DML Branches. Each week, parents or caregivers are invited to pick up free, shelf-stable meals for each child at the Branch Library nearest them. Beginning July 1 through August 12, the allowable quantity increases from 5 to 10 meals per child. Three pieces of fresh fruit are also available for each child. Pickup times are 4:30 - 5:30 pm at all locations. No registration is needed. Fall food distribution will resume in September.
