The Do's and Do Not's When a Crime Happens

Do:

- Report crimes or possible crimes to the police.
 - If it is an emergency, call 911.
 - Otherwise, call 937-333-2677.
 - A report can be done online as well as by going to daytonpolicereports.com/apps/citizenreporting/
- Look through video footage if you have a camera. Detectives need all the information about when the crime occurred and if there is any suspect information.

Don't:

- Report crimes on social media or social pages such as Facebook, Nextdoor, Ring Neighbors, etc.
- Report incidents at neighborhood meetings (unless an officer is present, a report cannot be taken from a third party.)
- Wait to report a crime. Report it immediately after it has been discovered.

- Over 100 million people have downloaded letgo, so if anything about a user or deal feels off, simply find a new one. There are a *lot*.

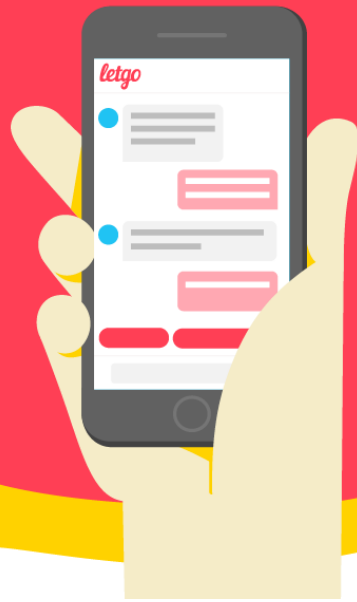

If you run into any red flags, like someone refusing to meet in a public place or changing your meetup location at the last minute, trust your gut, report that person to us in the rare cases where that's needed, and find another buyer or seller (don't worry, we've got plenty).

Closing the deal

Once you've met and made some small talk about the weather, it's time to close the deal!

When you're *buying*, always check out the item to make sure everything's just as you expected. If it's an electronic like a computer, phone, or full-size robotic butler, turn it on to make sure it works.

When you're *selling*, take a moment to count and inspect the money. (Stick to cash, too - don't accept gift cards, wire transfers, or personal checks.)

is on the rise in your neighborhood

An exhaust admission control device that reduces toxic gases and pollutants in exhaust gas

Contains valuable metals such as platinum

SUV's, because of their height, (easier to get to converter) and lighter weight cars, such as the Prius, (easier to jack up, if needed) are common targets, but all types of vehicles are prone to this theft. It only takes about 5 minutes to steal your converter.



What can you do to prevent Catalytic converter thefts?

- Park your car in your garage whenever possible
- Park in a well-lit area
- Set your car alarm to pick up vibrations
- Use motion sensor lights in your driveway
