Disorderly Subject

DATE	TIME	LOCATION	SYNOPSIS
05/15/2022	0050	211 South Wilkinson Street	Officers along with four other witnesses observed the suspect smack the victim in the face. The victim advised that she did not want to speak with officers and that she just wanted to take care of her business.

Aggravated Assault

05/13/2022	1100	I75SB-Second Street	The suspect and victim were leaving court at same time. Dustin has a protection order against Joseph. As they both started accelerating getting onto I75, Joseph was driving erratically. Dustin began to bump Joseph's vehicle's rear end. At some point one of the bumps caused Joseph to lose control of the car and slam into the retaining wall. Both suspects were transported to the Montgomery County Jail without incident.

05/10/2022	1100	215 East Third Street	Known suspect stole numerous electronic items from the library. He was arrested on scene trying to flee the scene and was transported to the Montgomery County Jail without incident.

05/15/2022	1218	501 East Fifth Street	Possible suspect entered the store and walked back to the clothing racks. He grabbed a shirt and a pair of pants, went behind a rack and placed them under his shirt before exiting the store. This incident was caught on video.

05/14/2022	1530	215 East Third Street	Unknown suspect stole the victim's cellphone from the library desk. This incident was caught on video.
05/14/2022	2217	100 North Jefferson Street @ SE	Unknown suspect asked to use the victim's cellphone. When the victim became uncomfortable with the suspect using his phone, he asked for it back and the suspect gave it to him, but then grabbed one of the victim's shopping bags before fleeing the scene.

05/10/2022	1458	417 East Third Street	Unknown suspect entered the victim's vehicle by unknown means as there was no damage and stole two bottles of wine.
05/12/2022	1800	440 Dayton Towers Drive @ 909	Unknown suspect forced down the window of the victim's vehicle and stole several personal documents. The victim advised no damage was done to his vehicle. The victim spoke with management, who advised they would be reviewing the video footage.

05/09/2022	1930	205 Jackson Street @ 1	Unknown suspect stole the victim's vehicle that was parked in front of the noted address unlocked and running with the keys in the ignition.
05/15/2022	2017	330 West Second Street	Unknown suspect stole the victim's vehicle that was parked in front of the jail that was left unlocked and running with the keys in the ignition while he dropped off a DoorDash order inside the jail. The jail was able to identify the suspect as Barry Satterfield as he was just visiting his girlfriend, who is currently incarcerated.

05/11/2022	1600	32 North Ludlow Street	The victims were inside the store speaking with the cashier when they were approached by the suspect, Art Glover, who accused them of stealing his bag. Art grabbed the victims and started fighting with them before they had a chance to exit the store. After officers reviewed the video footage, it

			showed Art was the primary aggressor in this incident. He was transported to the Montgomery County Jail without incident.

Narcotics

05/09/2022	1239	35 West Fourth Street	Lieutenant Riegel attempted to stop the suspect for traffic violations. He had a sling style backpack, which was later determined to have marijuana, possible methamphetamines, and possible crack inside after Damon began resisting. He was coming from the RTA hub.
05/12/2022	0955	600 Wayne Avenue	Suspect was observed in a high traffic area, Courthouse Square approaching people. This area is known for open air drug sales. When approached by officers, suspect was cooperative and consented to a weapons pat down. At that time, possible powder cocaine was located in his coin pocket on his pants. Suspect was issued an open air container citation and charged with felony possession of drugs. He was transported to the Montgomery County Jail after being cleared from the hospital for previous injuries.
05/10/2022	1430	15 North Main Street	The suspect was stopped after reports of a physical altercation with a female. Before officers placed the suspect into the back of a cruiser, they asked him if he has anything on him. He advised that he had drugs in his front pocket. Officers located 12 grams of crystal meth on his person. He was transported to the Montgomery County Jail.

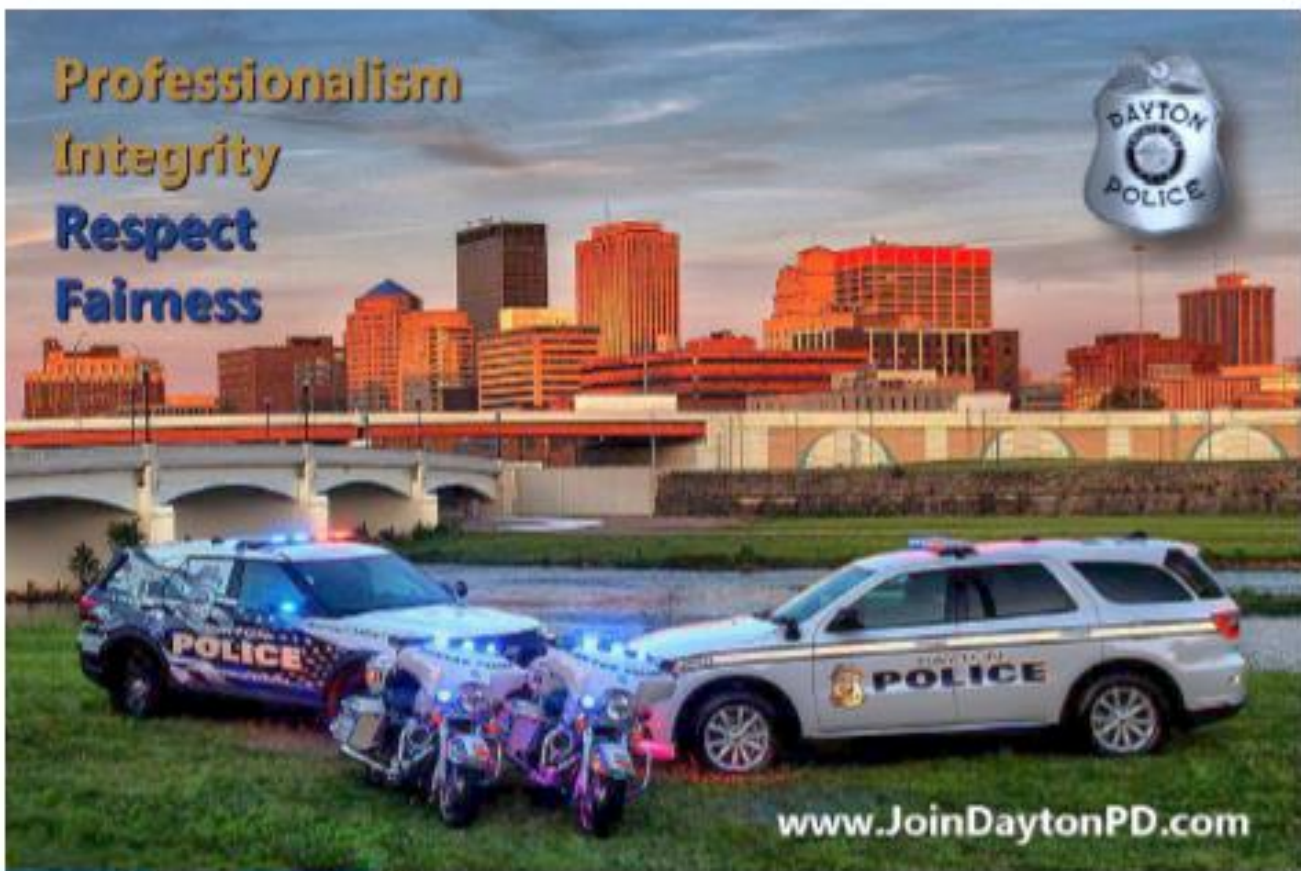
Criminal Damaging/Vandalism

DATE	TIME	LOCATION	SYNOPSIS
05/09/2022	0100	1 Jackson Street	(This is also marked under theft from motor vehicle) Unknown suspect broke out the window of the victim's vehicle and stole a pair of headphones.
05/09/2022	1530	28 South Jefferson Street	Two unknown suspects broke out the window of the victim's vehicle before fleeing the scene. Nothing was taken from the vehicle.
05/09/2022	2100	221 South Ludlow Street	Unknown suspect broke out the front passenger window of the victim's vehicle with a large rock. The vehicle was ransacked, but the victim advised nothing was missing.
05/10/2022	1329	221 South Ludlow Street	Unknown suspect broke out the passenger window of the victim's vehicle. The victim advised that nothing was taken.
05/15/2022	1745	30 South Main Street	Unknown suspect damaged the glass on the front entry door. Officers did not observe any camera's pointing to the entry door.

Trespass

05/09/2022	1000	4 South Main Street	Known suspect was acting aggressive toward another patron at the RTA hub. He stated to officers that he was previously trespassed by the RTA supervisor. suspect was transported to the Montgomery County Jail without incident.
05/12/2022	0826	126 West Fifth Street @ 110	GDPM officers were contacted by GDPM in regards to trespassers in apartment 1107. The resident of the apartment allowed officers inside where they located suspect asleep on an air mattress. He had been trespassed from all GDPPM property back on April 26th, 2022. He was transported to the Montgomery County Jail without incident.
05/12/2022	1153	126 West Fifth Street	Two known suspects, had previously been trespassed from the noted location by GDPM officers. They were located hanging out in the courtyard after being told to leave. They were arrested. One was found to be in possession of suspected methamphetamines. Both suspects were transported to the Montgomery County Jail, but due to one being nine months pregnant she was refused. A summons in lieu of physical arrest was completed for her.

5 STEPS TO A SAFER NEIGHBORHOOD

STEP 1

Get to Know Your Neighbors

- Exchange phone numbers (home, work, cell)
- Learn each other's routines (work schedules, vacation plans, guests' visits, scheduled workers)
- Regularly check on elderly neighbors
- Volunteer to pick up your neighbor's newspapers when they are gone
- Organize or join a Neighborhood Watch Group for your block*

STEP 2

Don't be a Target

- Have plenty of lighting around your home; use motion sensors, if possible
- Don't leave window or doors open, even on a hot day, if you are not home
- Leave lights on inside your home or use timers when you're gone
- Lock your car and keep valuables out of sight
- Secure gates and fences that are easily accessible
- Have keys ready when coming home; don't fumble around at your door
- Check your surroundings when approaching your door at night
- Be wary of solicitors at your door, even in the day time

STEP 3

Report Suspicious Activity

- Call 911 whenever something looks unusual (strange cars with people in them in front of houses; strangers checking out houses or cars)
- Have a pen and paper handy to write down details that could help police

STEP 4

Get Out and About

- Walk around your neighborhood or sit on your front porch as much as possible
- Encourage your neighbors to get out with you

STEP 5

Keep Our Neighborhoods Neat and Clean

- Pick up trash, even if it's not yours or in front of your house
- Keep yards maintained and looking good
- Trim hedges that can be used as hiding places



START A NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH PROGRAM

You Will Need

- A person or group of people committed to starting a Neighborhood Watch.
- A planning committee to initiate the program.
- A list of what issues initially need to be addressed in your community.
- A means of communicating with the residents (e-mail, fliers, telephone trees, etc.)
- Publicity for the initial Neighborhood Watch meeting.
- A meeting agenda to keep things moving and on track.
- A place to meet (resident's home or apartment, community center, school, library, etc.)
- A crime prevention officer to discuss the crime issues in the neighborhood and to help train members.
- A map of the community with spaces for names, addresses, and phone numbers of all households.
- A sign-up sheet for those interested in becoming block or building captains.
- Brochures or other materials on topics of interest to the residents.
- Neighborhood Watch signs to be posted around the community. Some jurisdictions require a minimum number of participants before Neighborhood Watch signs can be posted.
- Facts about crime in your neighborhood. These can be found in police reports, newspapers, and residents' perception about crime. Often residents' opinions are not supported by facts, and accurate information can reduce fear of crime.

Generate Excitement

- Mix business with pleasure and allow attendees time to socialize.
- Seek out neighborhood go-getters, such as civic leaders and elected officials, to be your advocates and mentors.
- Work with existing organizations such as citizens' association, tenants' association, or housing authorities.
- Provide speakers on topics of community interest.
- Link crime prevention into activities promoted by other groups: child protection, anti-vandalism projects, community service, arson prevention, recreation activities for young people.
- Start a neighborhood newsletter.
- Arrange for McGruff to make a surprise appearance at a meeting, rally, or other event.

Build Partnerships

- The police or sheriff's office's endorsement is critical to a Watch group's credibility. These agencies are the major sources of information on local crime patterns, crime prevention education, and crime reporting.
- Local businesses and organizations can help provide fliers and a newsletter, offer meeting places, and distribute crime prevention information. Ask an electronics store to donate cellular phones.
- Libraries can provide research materials, videos, computers, and meeting space.
- Media can aid Neighborhood Watches by publicizing recruitment drives.
- Look to volunteer centers, parent groups, and labor unions for advice on recruiting volunteers.
- Teenagers are valuable resources. They can be an integral part of a citizens' patrol including biking and rollerblading to scout the neighborhood.
- Places of worship can provide meeting space and a good source of volunteers.
