Theft From Motor Vehicle

DATE	TIME	LOCATION	SYNOPSIS
05/16/2022	1200	541 Water St Apt 106	Unknown suspect entered the victim's unlocked vehicle and stole a backpack that contained camera equipment that belonged to Channel 7.
05/20/2022	2030	33 E Fifth St	Unknown suspect entered the bed of the victim's truck and stole a Stihl brand saw. Officer spoke with the staff at the Radisson, who advised that they do not have cameras facing the incident location.

05/20/2022	2145	225 E Sixth St	Unknown suspect stole the victim's vehicle that was left unlocked with the spare keys in the center console.
05/21/2022	0300	100 Clay St	Known suspect got into an altercation with the victim and fled the scene in her vehicle. Domestic violence packet was completed as well as the motor vehicle theft.

			covid and you are going to die.” The suspect then grabbed the victim by the throat, throwing him to the ground. The suspect then punched the victim in the face before fleeing the scene.
05/18/2022	1645	215 E Third St	Known suspect was trying to fight the victim inside the library. Security kicked them out. When they got to the statue outside the rear door, the suspect punched the victim numerous times, causing the victim to hit her head on the ground. The victim was transported to Children’s Medical Center by private conveyance after the suspect fled the library.

Criminal Damaging/Vandalism

DATE	TIME	LOCATION	SYNOPSIS
05/16/2022	1900	113 E Second St	Unknown suspect broke out the front window to Dayton Stencil. It does not appear that anyone physically entered the building as the entrance door was still locked. The business does not have any security cameras.
05/19/2022	1645	51 N Jefferson St	Unknown juvenile suspects broke out the window to the victim’s vehicle and fled the scene after being observed by the security guard.
05/20/2022	0120	140 N Jefferson St	Two unknown females and one unknown male were walking past the CareSource building when they kicked the thigh high lamp post, causing damage. A summons in lieu of physical arrest was completed on one of the suspects, as the officer observed him walking down the street near CareSource and he matched the male from the video footage.
05/21/2022	2130	501 E Fifth St	Unknown suspect broke out two windows of the Goodwill Store. The victim was in the process of reviewing video when officers arrived.
05/22/2022	0530	508 E Fifth St	Unknown suspect picked up a stand that contained cigarette butts and threw it at the victim’s store window, causing it to crack. This incident was caught on video.

05/16/2022	1305	600 S Jefferson St	Known suspect was panhandling at the access road identified as ramp 356 to the entrance of eastbound State Route 35.

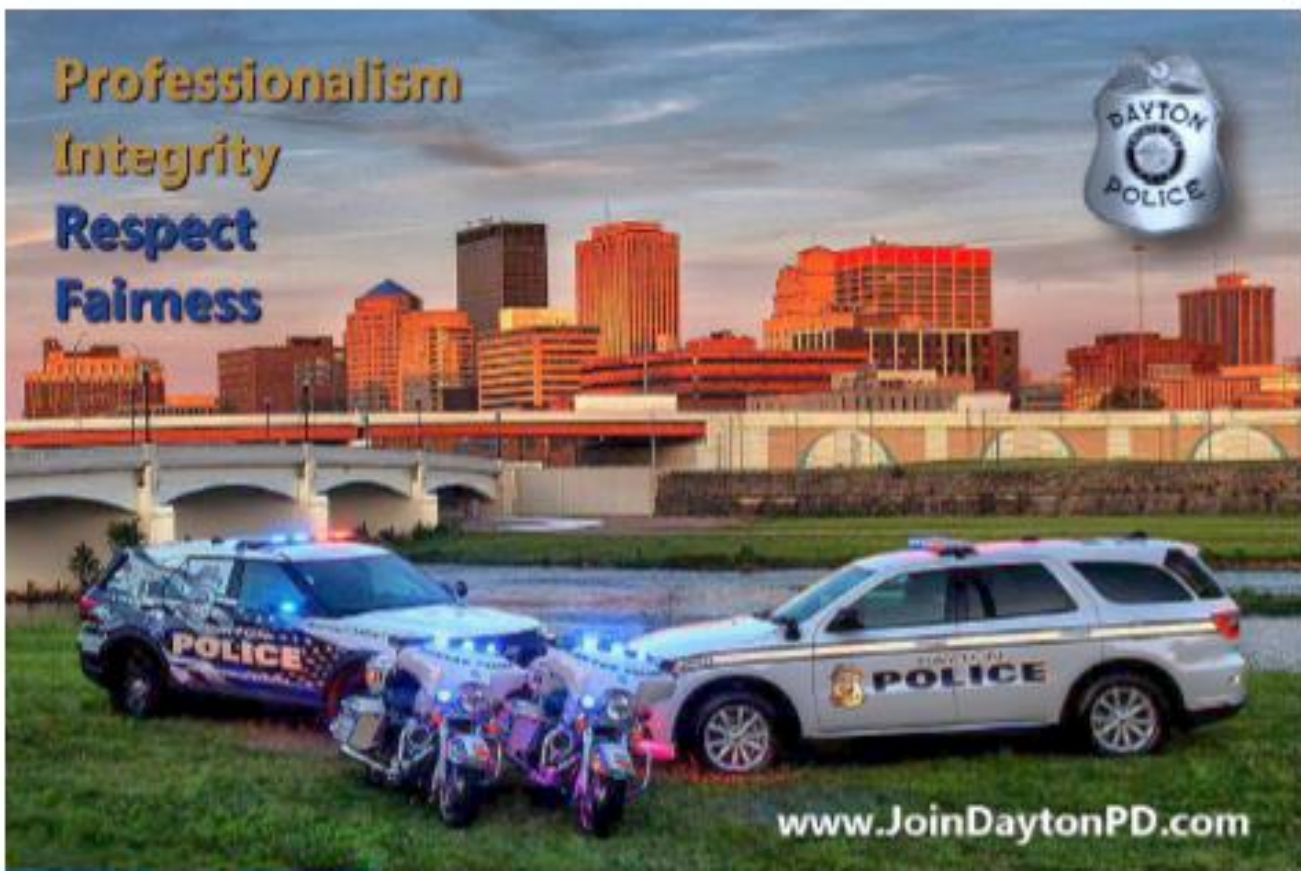
Trespass

05/17/2022	1000	4 S Main St	Known suspect, Anthony Vines was arrested for trespassing after he was told to leave property by RTA staff. The suspect also had a Dayton capias.
05/19/2022	1157	126 W Fifth St	The manager called in a trespass complaint. The resident of apartment 1004 advised that there were numerous people in her apartment that she did not want there. When officers were let into the apartment, they located two known suspects, Samantha Alspach and David Perkins, who were trespassed from the property. Both were transported to the Montgomery County Jail without incident.
05/20/2022	1235	126 West Fifth Street	GDPM officers observed the known suspect, Donnie Jones as being trespassed from all GDPM property exiting the elevator. The suspect was transported to the Montgomery County Jail without incident.

5 STEPS TO A SAFER NEIGHBORHOOD

STEP 1

Get to Know Your Neighbors

- Exchange phone numbers (home, work, cell)
- Learn each other's routines (work schedules, vacation plans, guests' visits, scheduled workers)
- Regularly check on elderly neighbors
- Volunteer to pick up your neighbor's newspapers when they are gone
- Organize or join a Neighborhood Watch Group for your block*

STEP 2

Don't be a Target

- Have plenty of lighting around your home; use motion sensors, if possible
- Don't leave window or doors open, even on a hot day, if you are not home
- Leave lights on inside your home or use timers when you're gone
- Lock your car and keep valuables out of sight
- Secure gates and fences that are easily accessible
- Have keys ready when coming home; don't fumble around at your door
- Check your surroundings when approaching your door at night
- Be wary of solicitors at your door, even in the day time

STEP 3

Report Suspicious Activity

- Call 911 whenever something looks unusual (strange cars with people in them in front of houses; strangers checking out houses or cars)
- Have a pen and paper handy to write down details that could help police

STEP 4

Get Out and About

- Walk around your neighborhood or sit on your front porch as much as possible
- Encourage your neighbors to get out with you

STEP 5

Keep Our Neighborhoods Neat and Clean

- Pick up trash, even if it's not yours or in front of your house
- Keep yards maintained and looking good
- Trim hedges that can be used as hiding places



START A NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH PROGRAM

You Will Need

- A person or group of people committed to starting a Neighborhood Watch.
- A planning committee to initiate the program.
- A list of what issues initially need to be addressed in your community.
- A means of communicating with the residents (e-mail, fliers, telephone trees, etc.)
- Publicity for the initial Neighborhood Watch meeting.
- A meeting agenda to keep things moving and on track.
- A place to meet (resident's home or apartment, community center, school, library, etc.)
- A crime prevention officer to discuss the crime issues in the neighborhood and to help train members.
- A map of the community with spaces for names, addresses, and phone numbers of all households.
- A sign-up sheet for those interested in becoming block or building captains.
- Brochures or other materials on topics of interest to the residents.
- Neighborhood Watch signs to be posted around the community. Some jurisdictions require a minimum number of participants before Neighborhood Watch signs can be posted.
- Facts about crime in your neighborhood. These can be found in police reports, newspapers, and residents' perception about crime. Often residents' opinions are not supported by facts, and accurate information can reduce fear of crime.

Generate Excitement

- Mix business with pleasure and allow attendees time to socialize.
- Seek out neighborhood go-getters, such as civic leaders and elected officials, to be your advocates and mentors.
- Work with existing organizations such as citizens' association, tenants' association, or housing authorities.
- Provide speakers on topics of community interest.
- Link crime prevention into activities promoted by other groups: child protection, anti-vandalism projects, community service, arson prevention, recreation activities for young people.
- Start a neighborhood newsletter.
- Arrange for McGruff to make a surprise appearance at a meeting, rally, or other event.

Build Partnerships

- The police or sheriff's office's endorsement is critical to a Watch group's credibility. These agencies are the major sources of information on local crime patterns, crime prevention education, and crime reporting.
- Local businesses and organizations can help provide fliers and a newsletter, offer meeting places, and distribute crime prevention information. Ask an electronics store to donate cellular phones.
- Libraries can provide research materials, videos, computers, and meeting space.
- Media can aid Neighborhood Watches by publicizing recruitment drives.
- Look to volunteer centers, parent groups, and labor unions for advice on recruiting volunteers.
- Teenagers are valuable resources. They can be an integral part of a citizens' patrol including biking and rollerblading to scout the neighborhood.
- Places of worship can provide meeting space and a good source of volunteers.
