



## **Meg Maloney named manager of Office of Sustainability**

City Manager Shelley Dickstein announces the promotion of Meg Maloney to the position of manager of the City of Dayton Office of Sustainability, effective July 3.

Maloney will be responsible for oversight of sustainability initiatives designed to make the City of Dayton a regional and national leader in reducing environmental impacts and municipal carbon footprint. Dayton's sustainability goals include carbon-neutrality by 2050.

Maloney has worked as sustainability specialist for the City of Dayton since May of 2020. Her contributions to the City's sustainability success include:

- Saving the City over \$3.5 million through energy efficiency measures, auditing, and cost avoidance in 2022.
- Facilitating and restarting the City's electric aggregation program, which has saved the City of Dayton millions in energy costs and saved participating Dayton residential power customers an average of \$350 last year.
- Application for over \$7 million in grants for the City of Dayton over the past year.
- Working closely with the Old North Dayton and McCook Field communities around U.S. EPA Superfund site reuse.
- Recognition by the Ohio Mayors Alliance, Power Clean Future Ohio, Green Umbrella, and the Midwest Sustainability Summit for sustainability leadership at the City of Dayton. In addition, she was recognized in the "Inno Under 25" list by the Dayton Business Journal in 2021.

Maloney earned a M.S. in Biological Science at the University of Dayton (2021), with a concentration in Sustainability and Environmental Science. She also earned a B.S. in Environmental Biology at U.D. (2018). She was a Sustainability Fellow at the University of New Hampshire and a sustainability intern at the City of Dayton.

Maloney will replace Mark Charles as manager of the Office of Sustainability. Charles is retiring after a 40-year career in environmental and sustainability work.

"Meg has a demonstrated record of protecting the environment while bringing fiscal benefits to City operations," Dickstein said. "We are happy to know that her success in sustainability work will continue to benefit the City of Dayton and our residential and business communities."
