Summer is the Perfect Time to get an ID for Your Kids

(COLUMBUS, Ohio) – Summer break is in full swing and the Ohio Bureau of Motor Vehicles (BMV) and the Ohio School Safety Center (OSSC) are reminding parents that this season is an ideal time to get a state-issued identification card (ID) for children and teens. The BMV operates the ID R Kids [program](#) as a safety resource for parents and local law enforcement agencies.

"Summer brings a lot of activity and movement for kids," said Ohio BMV Registrar Charlie Norman. "An ID card not only provides a layer of security but can also be critical in emergencies or travel situations."

The ID includes important information such as the child's name, date of birth, and address. It can assist law enforcement in the event your child goes missing and can help confirm identity if a child is traveling alone or needs medical attention. For teenagers, the ID can be helpful for job applications, opening bank accounts, or signing up for summer programs.

"Having a state-issued ID for your child is a smart step every parent can take to support their child's safety," said OSSC Executive Director Emily Torok. "It's a simple tool that can make a big difference."

In its recently released [report](#), the Ohio Missing Persons Working Group recommended that the OSSC and BMV work together to increase awareness about the ID R Kids youth identification card program. In addition to this news release, the two Ohio Department of Public Safety divisions will be highlighting the program on social media, incorporating mentions of the program in speaking engagements and at conferences, and contacting Ohioans directly to ensure they are aware of the program.

An Ohio ID is easy to obtain. Visit any Ohio BMV license agency and provide the child's proof of name, date of birth, proof of residency, proof of legal presence, and Social Security number (if ever assigned).

Any child under the age of 18 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian, who must also provide proof of name, date of birth, proof of residency, proof of legal presence, and Social Security number or their Ohio driver license or state ID.

The ID is \$10, but free if a child is permanently disabled.

Licensing & Microchips



LICENSE VS. MICROCHIP

In Ohio, the law states all dogs three months of age and older must have (and wear!) a valid year license. Dog Licenses are sold every year from Dec. 1 through Jan. 31 and can be purchased at the County Administration Building, the Animal Resource Center (ARC), or at one of our many outposts listed on our website. You may also choose to purchase your license online by visiting www.mcoho.org/dogs.

Microchips are an optional and permanent additional form of identification. The procedure is simple and consists of injecting a radio-frequency identification implant under the loose skin between a dog's shoulder blades; no anesthetic is required and the process takes only seconds. Once properly implanted, you must register your pet's microchip in a database with your contact information.

WHY SHOULD I LICENSE MY DOG?

Aside from the fact that it's the law, there are many benefits to licensing your dog:

- Montgomery County dog licenses can be traced 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, making it your dog's ticket home
- Licensed dogs are held 14 days before becoming property of the County, compared to three days for those without a license
- Reduced impoundment fees

Often, we're asked "why should I license my dog if they have a microchip?" Simply put - a dog license is the only **legal proof of ownership** in Ohio. So even if your dog is chipped, a license is required.

WHY SHOULD I MICROCHIP MY DOG?

Things happen, and dogs get lost. Unfortunately, sometimes they slip out of their collars or dash out the door, leaving them lost without a license. A microchip provides additional, permanent ID that cannot fall off, be removed, or become difficult to read.

At ARC, we don't believe pets are "like" family - they ARE family. Taking the simple and inexpensive step to have your dog microchipped helps ensure your furry family member can be safely returned where they belong - home.

HOW OFTEN DO I HAVE TO RENEW MY DOG'S LICENSE?

Dog licenses are available for renewal on an annual basis from Dec. 1 through Jan. 31. After these dates, penalty fees may apply. If you would like to purchase a three-year or permanent dog license, they are exclusively sold by the Auditor's Office located in the Montgomery County Administration building at 451 West Third St. Dayton, OH 45422.

WHAT ABOUT OUR FELINE FRIENDS?

Ohio law does not require cats to be licensed like dogs. Of course, we encourage all owners to take every precaution to keep their pet safe. Cats can also be microchipped and owners can attach ID tags to their collars with their contact information.
